VILLAGE FUN

DNR Grant

The Village of Union Grove received a grant of \$19,574.15 for the 2010 recycling program on behalf Governor Jim Doyle and Department of Natural Resources. grant is based upon the total recycling costs for the municipality; including yard waste (leaves, brush, garden waste). The recycling program must meet the minimum requirements set by the state (tonnage per person based on population). In our case, for 2009, our standard/minimum was 82.40 pounds of recycling person. Our recyclables, without the yard waste, totaled 337.5 tons. That's 148.38 pounds per person! Union Grove did a really great job!

We also collected an estimated 2.62 tons of tires, 12.88 tons of waste oil and 288.25 of yard waste - an additional 133.55 pounds per person.

Great Results!

Union Grove Graded School collected 876 pounds

of aluminum cans during a recent Can Drive. They raised over \$460.00, which was donated to the Union Grove Recreation and Parks Department! Not only did the children learn about recycling, they also learned about helping other organizations through their efforts.

Green Facts

- * Five 2-liter plastic PET bottles(#1) yield enough fiber for one extra-large T-shirt or one square foot of carpet. About 1,200 soda bottles could carpet the average living room. (Half of all polyester carpet manufactured in the United States is made from recycled plastic bottles.)
- * Wisconsin is the 19th state to pass a law mandating the recycling of e-waste (electronics). And remember, recycling is the law! Wisconsin passed a comprehensive recycling law that took effect in 1995. This law requires recycling by residents,



businesses, government, non-profits, multi-family units, schools, parks, public venues and events.

- Recycling 1 ton of glass saves 10 gallons of oil.
- * Each ton (2000 pounds) of recycled paper can save 17trees, 380 gallons of oil, three cubic yards of landfill space, 4000 kilowatts of energy and 7000 gallons of water. This represents a 64% energy savings, a 58% water savings, and 60 pounds less of air pollution!

We are always looking for Green Team volunteers. This is a great opportunity for Church groups, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, or anybody else that wants to help maintain the flower beds in Union Grove. Please remember to put your brush curbside. Do not put brush or clippings in the street.

DPW does not pick up yard waste or grass clippings that are raked or dumped into the street. Our street sweeper does not pick this up. It is a violation to mow or put your grass clippings into the street. The citation comes with a \$105.00 fine, so please help us all keep our streets clean. (See municipal code below)

Street and Water Main Project



I have received a lot of questions regarding the timing of this project, and why we decided to do everything at the same time. It is much less expensive to do everything from water main replacement, curb repair and street paving at the same time. If we were to do this type of project street by street, it would have lasted the entire summer. We wanted to complete the project in a timely manner so that the residents of the village could have a peaceful mid-summer. One without the backhoes, dust and

Municipal Code for the Village of Union Grove

Sec. 86-36. Yard waste and grass clippings.

- (a) Yard waste. All yard waste and garden clippings shall be cut to four-foot lengths and tied into bundles or shall be placed in open containers. Yard waste will be collected during the last full week of the month. (Will be picked up on the last Friday of the month March—November)
- (b) Grass clippings. The village will not provide any disposal of grass clippings. A resident will have three options to handle grass clippings as follows:
 - (1) Leave the clippings on the lawn.
 - (2) Compost the grass clipping in his personal compost pile to be located in the back of his property, not near the street and not to be a nuisance to the neighbors.
 - (3) Pay a private contractor for removal.

A MESSAGE FROM FIRE CHIEF CZERNIAK

With warmer weather hopefully here to stay, the opportunity to finally get outside for yard work, clean up and recreation, I must remind of you of several things to be careful of. Spring and summer should be a fun time of the year as long as fire and emergency issues are taken into consideration.

The increase of seasonal grilling



and portable patio fire pits is very popular this time of year. Please enjoy them safely; away from combustible materials and significantly away from any other


structures. Please consider wind conditions, other residences and the need for appropriate and responsible supervision.

As you proceed with yard clean up and the burning of yard debris, please remember that there are several rules that need to be adhered to within the Village.

- Be aware of acceptable (leaves, brush, vegetative debris, etc) and unacceptable (rubbish, garbage, oil, plastics, rubber, etc.) items that can and cannot be burned.
- Burning shall be from 9:00 a.m. to sunset or 7:00 p.m.
- Shall be at least 25 feet from any structure and 10 feet from the property line.
- Shall be constantly attended and extinguishment equipment readily available.

And please be aware of the burn ordinance to avoid any citations or dangerous situations.

As always, your smoke detector should be in good condition and the device itself should not be too old. If the device is older than 10 years, it is recommended that it be replaced. Be sure the batteries are



replaced and in good condition also. It's an inexpensive but necessary purchase that will only help if a situation ever develops in alerting you of the need to escape.



Still early in the process, we know it takes time, commitment and openness; we welcome your involvement, ideas and support. It is my responsibility to keep you as up-todate and informed as I can so please feel free to contact me at our station, where I typically spend mornings Monday through Friday. Our non-emergency number is 262-878-4181.

As I learn, I will share. I hope that we can all agree on the need and importance of this project. It will allow us long-term to continue saving taxpayer dollars by continuing to be a volunteer organization providing professional services at a great

savings to our own community.

As you see everywhere, road reconstruction in Union Grove is underway. Realizing that we are all affected, please understand that our need to respond is still of major importance, either responding to the station and/or to the scene in a rapid, safe way. We understand and appreciate the significance where seconds count and ask for your patience and indulgence as we work through the next few months of road construction.



sandwiches. A schedule of Events can be found and concert tickets may be purchased and printed on-line at www.racinecountyfair.com.



VILLAGE TIDBITS



Do Not Feed the Foxes

In an effort to prevent problems with the Red Fox, we are asking that all residents refrain from feeding the wildlife in our area. Occasionally fox, as well as other urban wildlife, become habituated to humans. Habituation can occur when the animals are fed either directly by humans or indirectly by animals feeding in garbage cans or on pet food left outside. Habituation of wildlife can lead to a loss of fear of humans and undesirable behavior that may include approaching too close to humans and pets, feeding from garbage cans or denning under a house.

In the spring, the fox may den underneath a porch or in a yard, while they are raising their pups. To reduce the chance of foxes becoming a nuisance, actively discourage red fox from visiting your property and reinforce their natural fear of humans. Follow these suggested actions to reduce the chance of negative interactions with red fox:

- DO NOT FEED THE FOXES!
- Secure garbage can lids.

 Feed pets indoors and do not leave pet food outside.

- Do not put meat scraps in compost pile.
- Keep outdoor BBQ grills clean and empty catch trays regularly
- Turn on outside lights .
- Remove bird feeders; fox will prey upon small rodents attracted by the bird feed on the ground.

Dumpsters on Loan

The Village provides a 6-yard dumpster, free of charge, to residential (single family or duplexes) customers in the Village for light cleanup projects.

There are restrictions on what can be put in these dumpsters. They are designed for household items only (clothes, toys, furniture, etc). They are NOT to be used for any type of building materials (roofing, drywall, cabinets, flooring, doors, etc), car parts or yard waste. If you have that type of project, you will need to take care of the disposal yourself, either by hauling the items to the landfill, or by renting a commercial dumpster.

Signs

Signs are NOT AL-LOWED on any light poles or flower planters in the Village of Union Grove! This includes rummage and garage sale signs, car wash signs, house for sale, etc. Please note that all signs posted on light poles or in planters will be removed and disposed of. Also, please remove your signs no later than one day after your sale or event.


